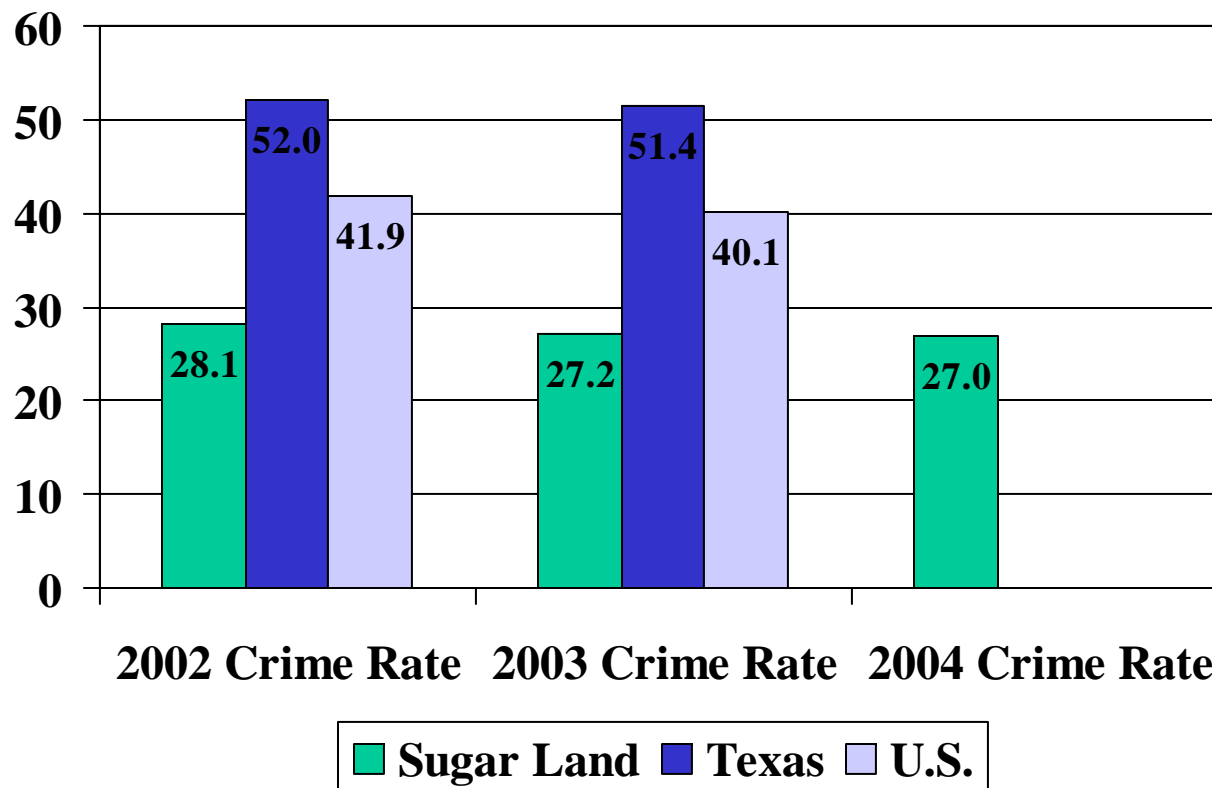

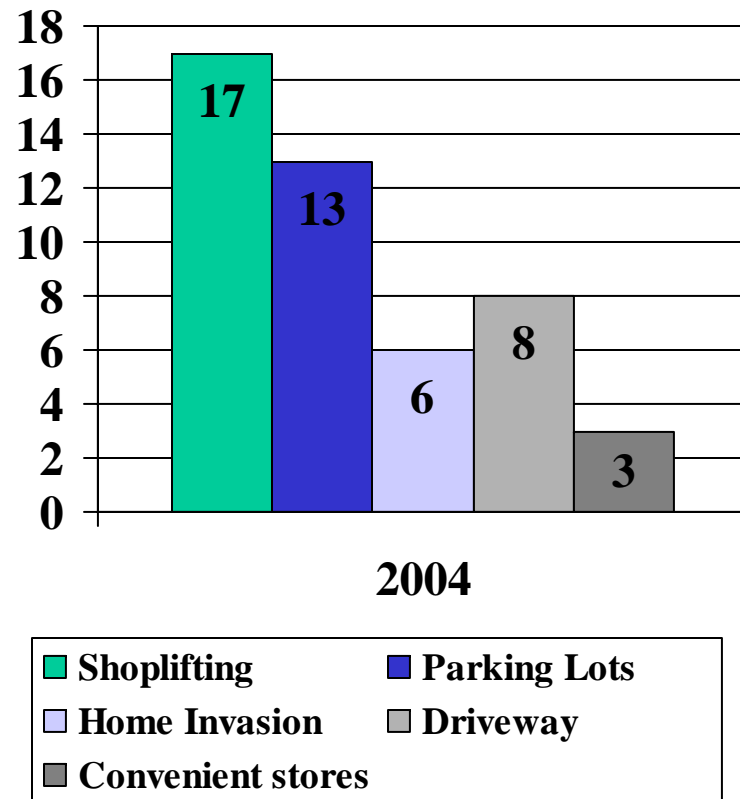
2003 State Clearance average - 18%

- 1 Bank Robbery

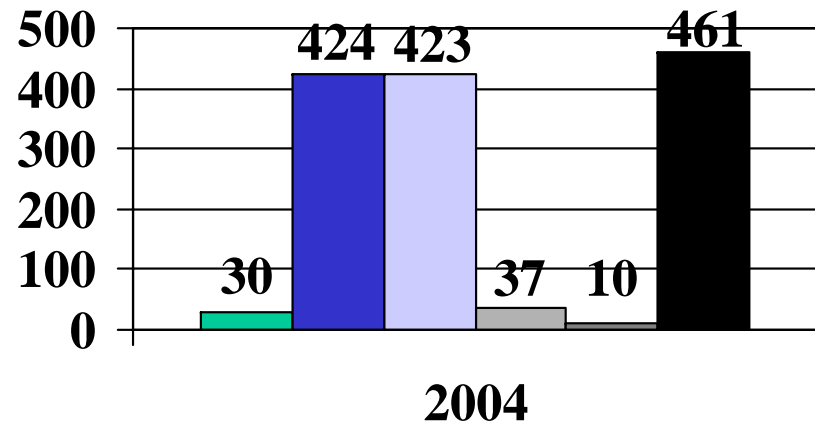


High incident locations - Target – 16 Foleys – 4 Mall – 4

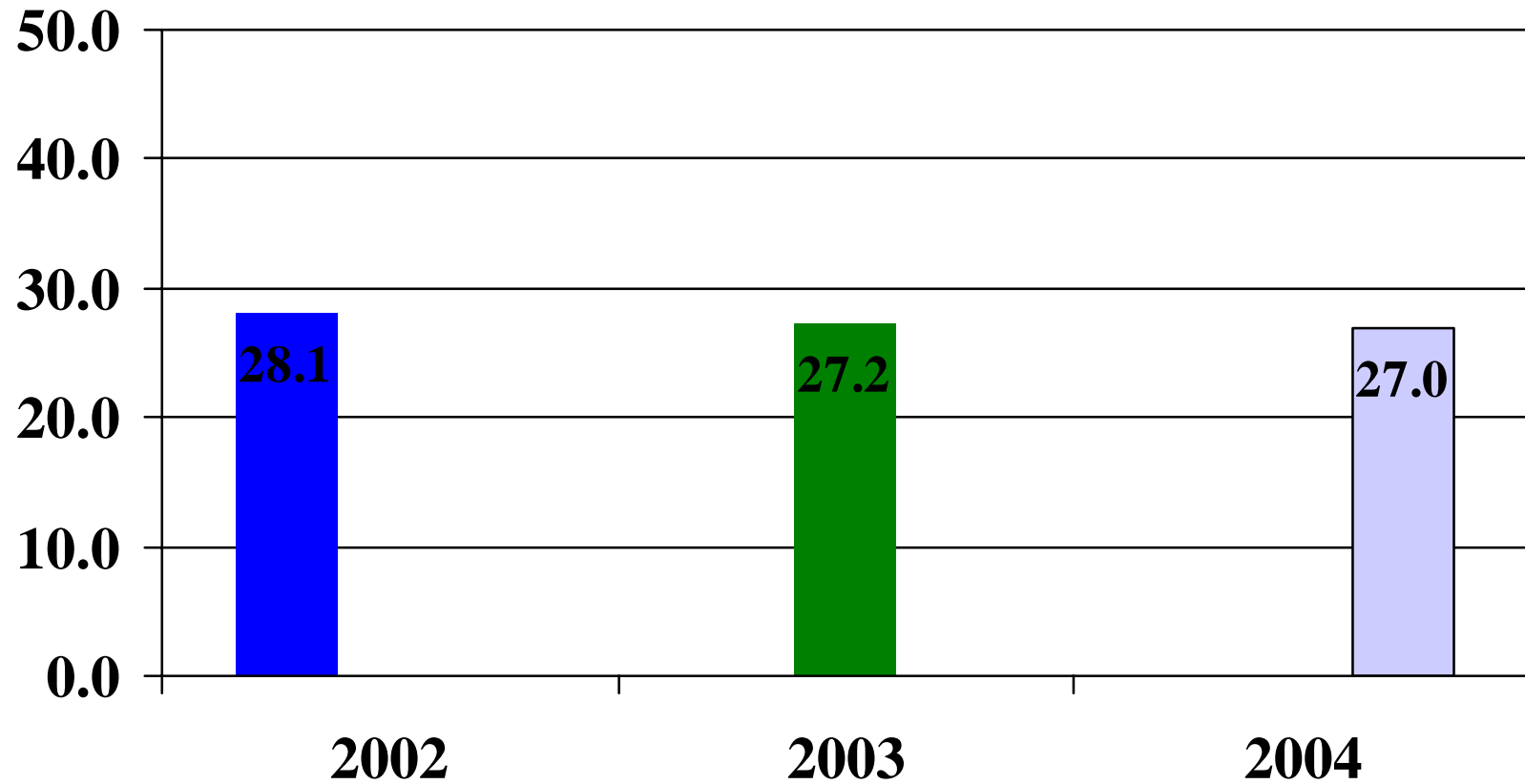


Theft (2004)

Part 1 Crime Rate per 1,000 population

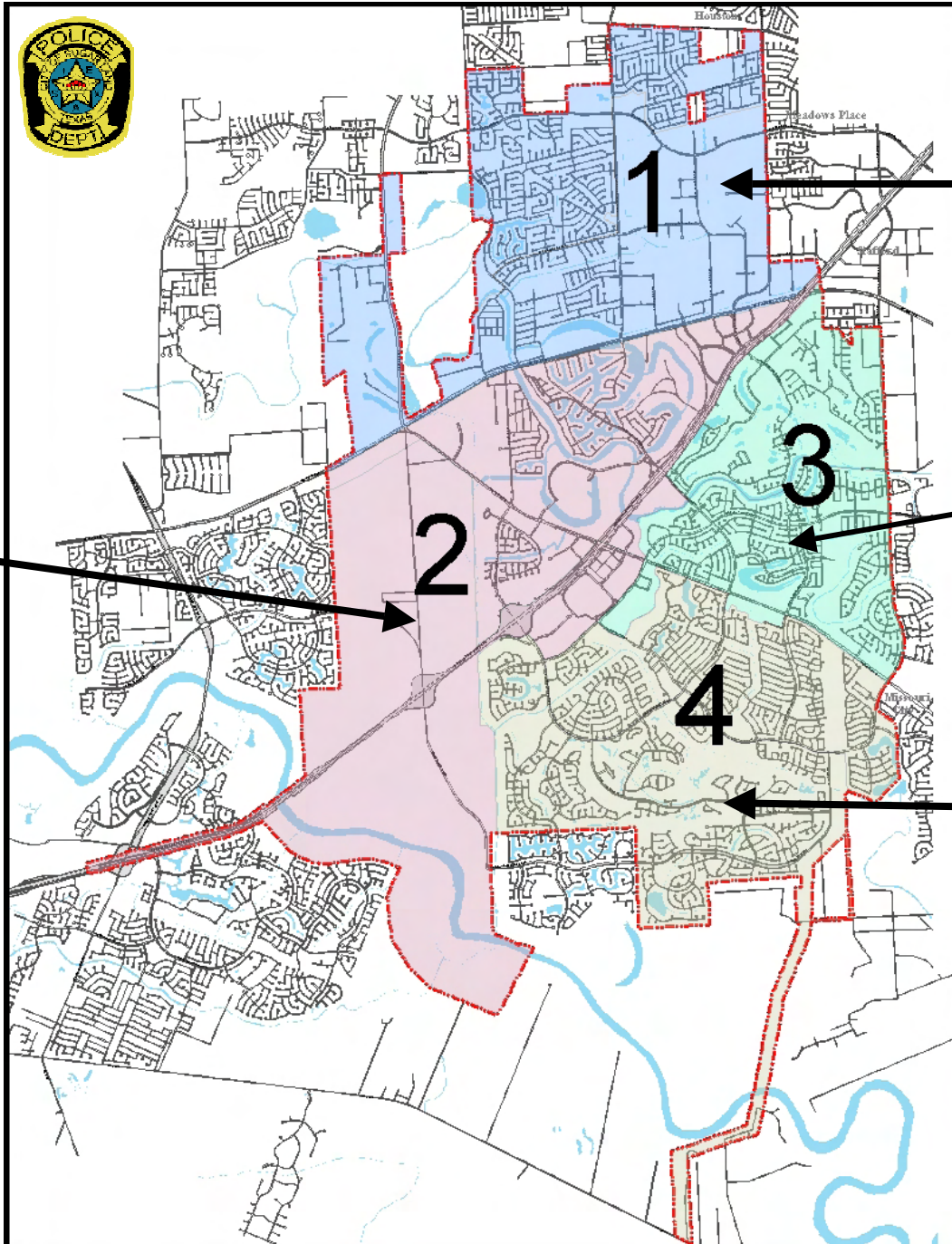

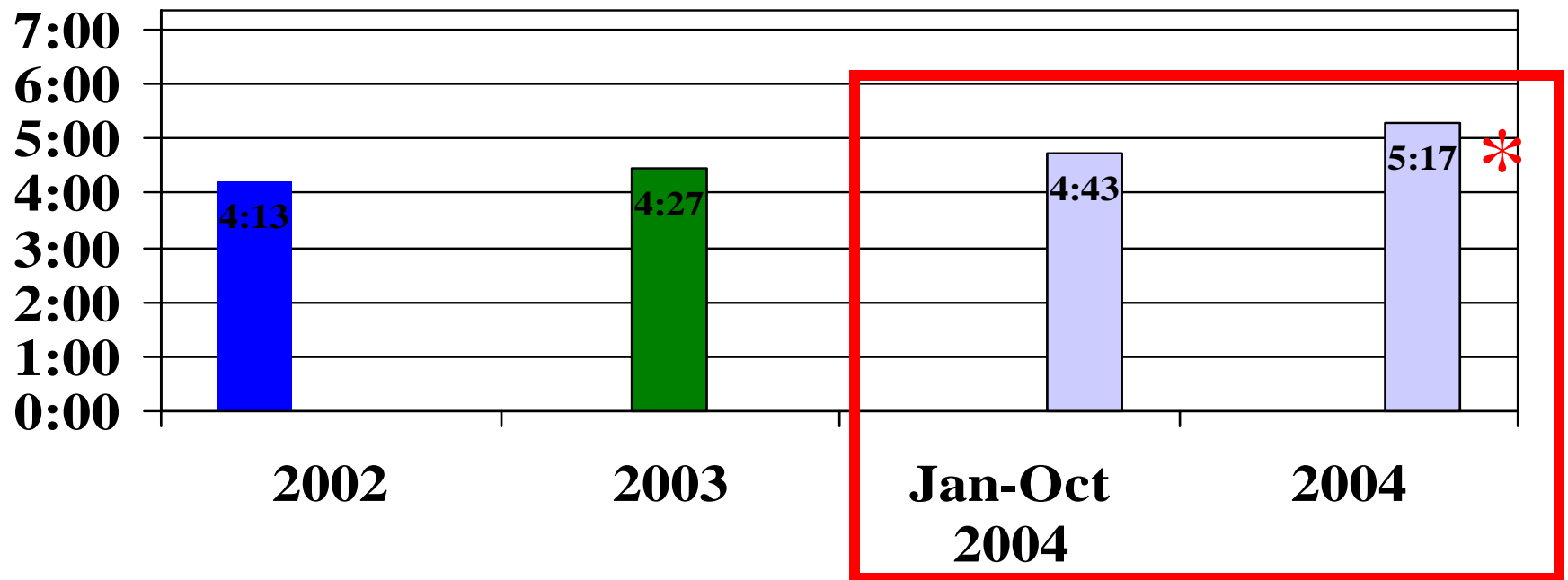

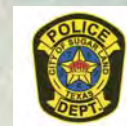

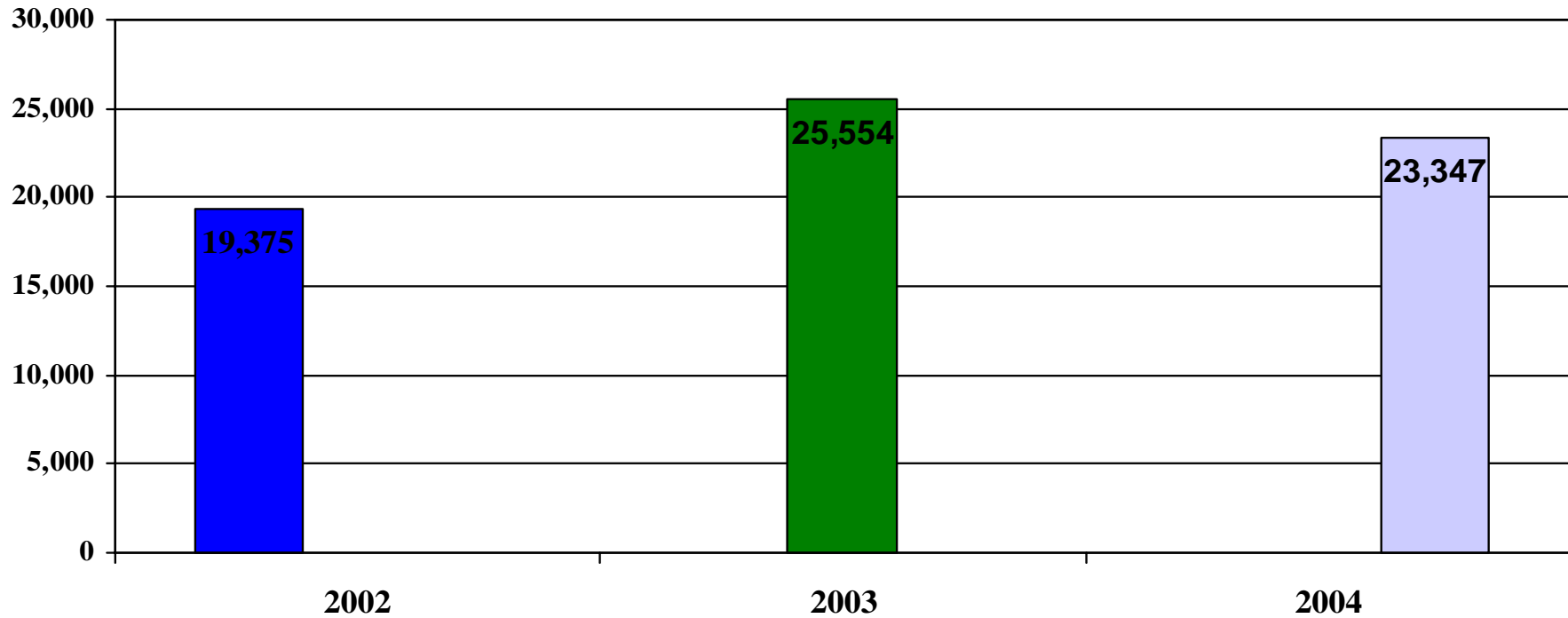

Definition: The Graph portrays the time it takes a police officer to respond to a priority one call from when the telephone call is received by the telecommunications operator to the time the first officer arrives at the location. A priority one call is defined as a call in which there exists an imminent threat to life and/or potentially severe property loss. The Patrol Division's goal is to have an average response time to priority one calls of less than five (5) minutes.

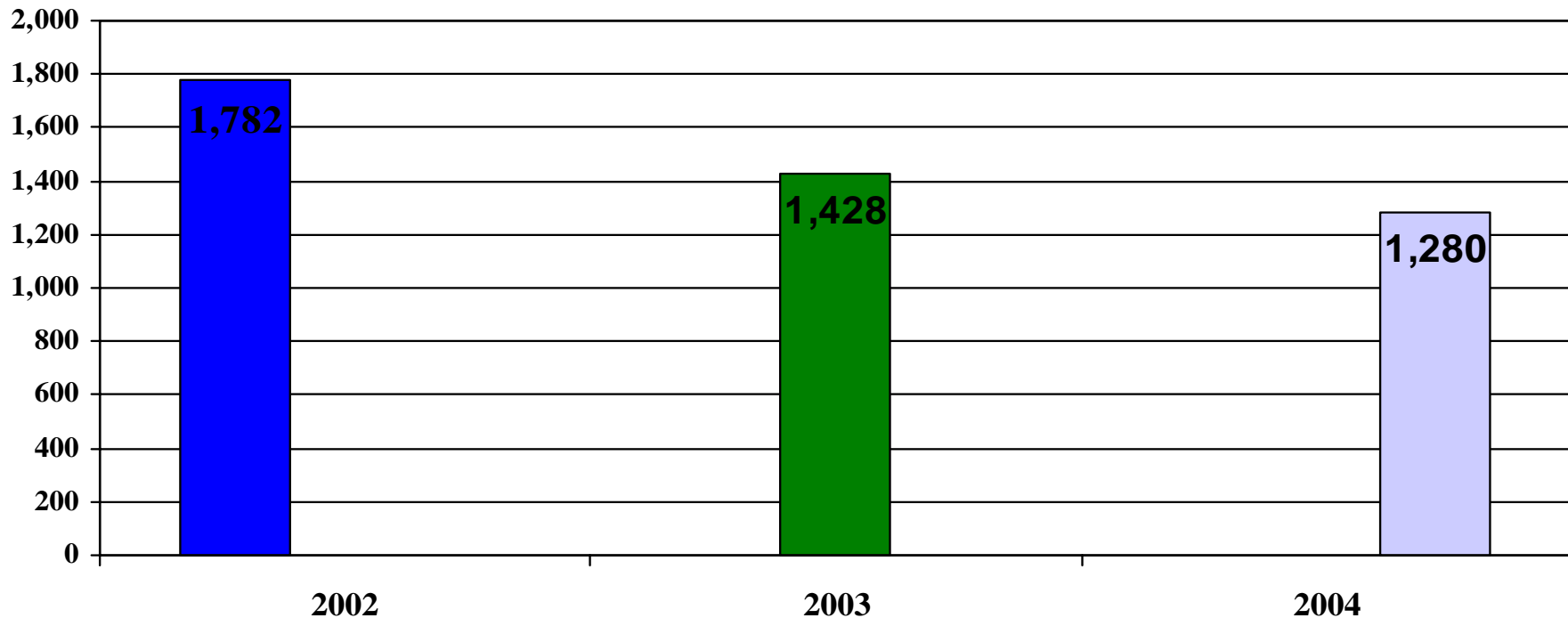

2002 - 2004

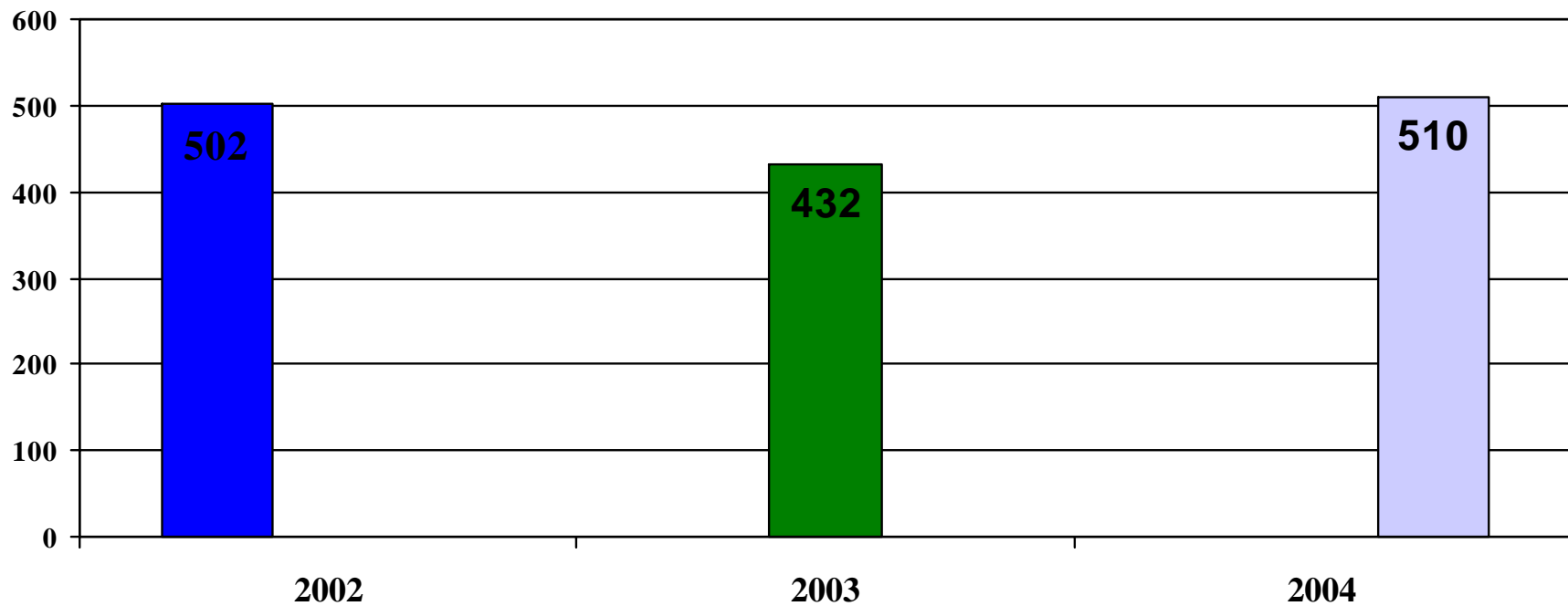

2002 - 2004



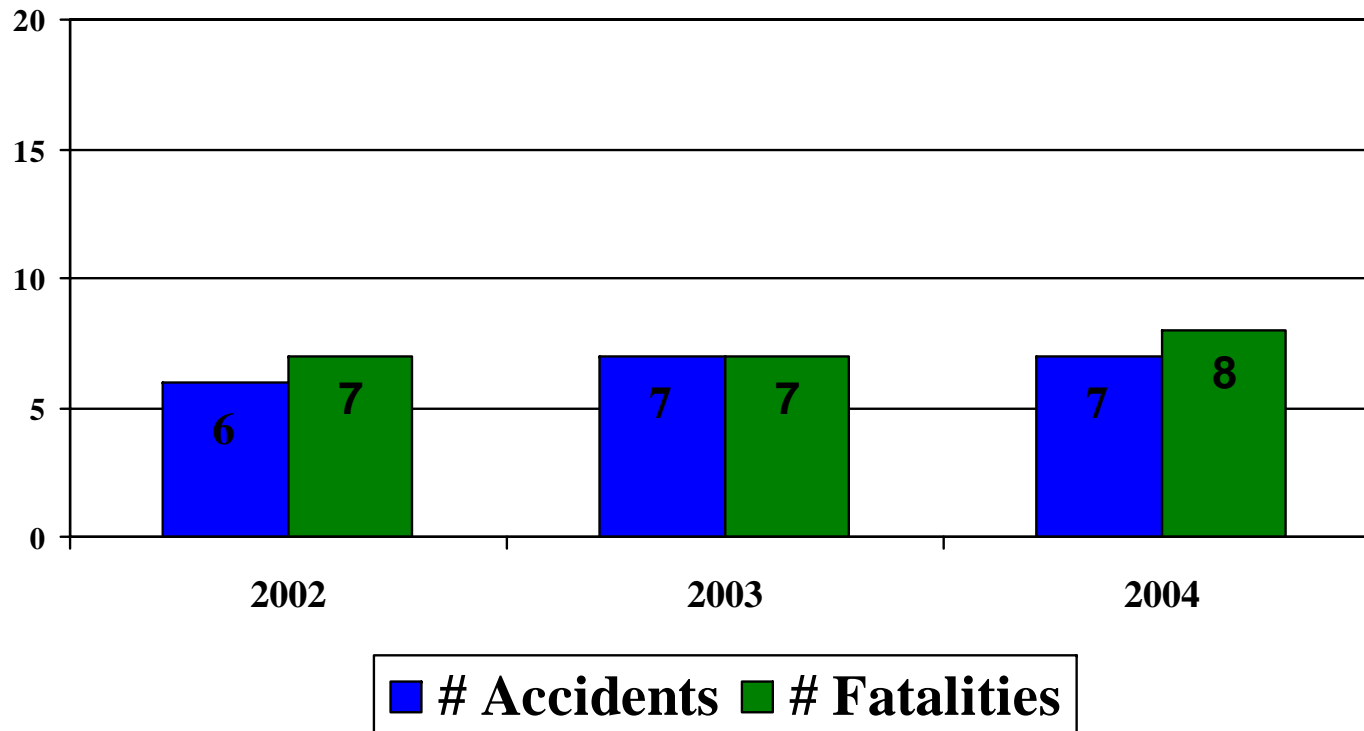
Definition: This graph represents the total number of minor accidents that occurred in Sugar Land in which an Officer investigated the collision. Minor accidents are those accidents that involve property damage only. This does not include non-reportable (damage under \$1,000) collisions or collisions in which the drivers just exchanged information.

- **Unsafe Lane Change**

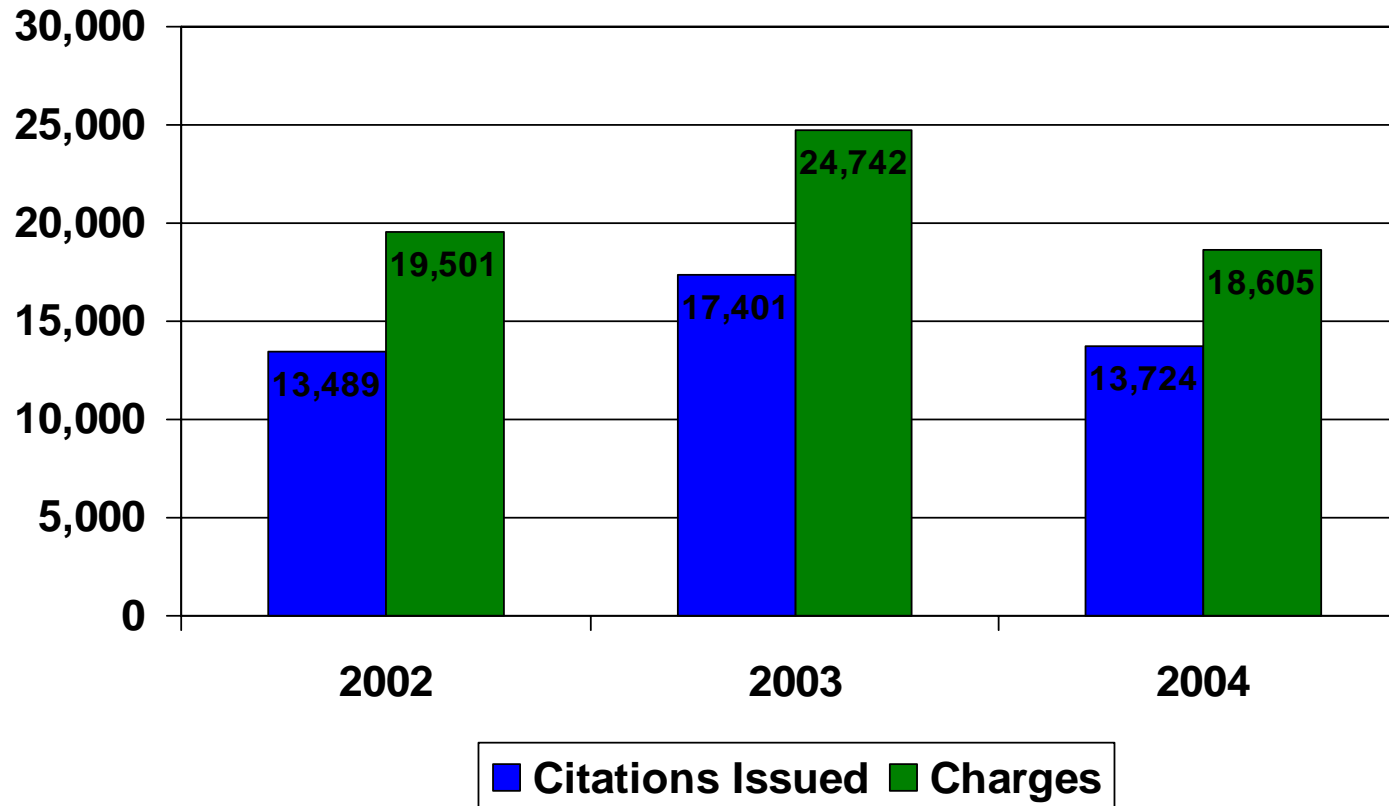

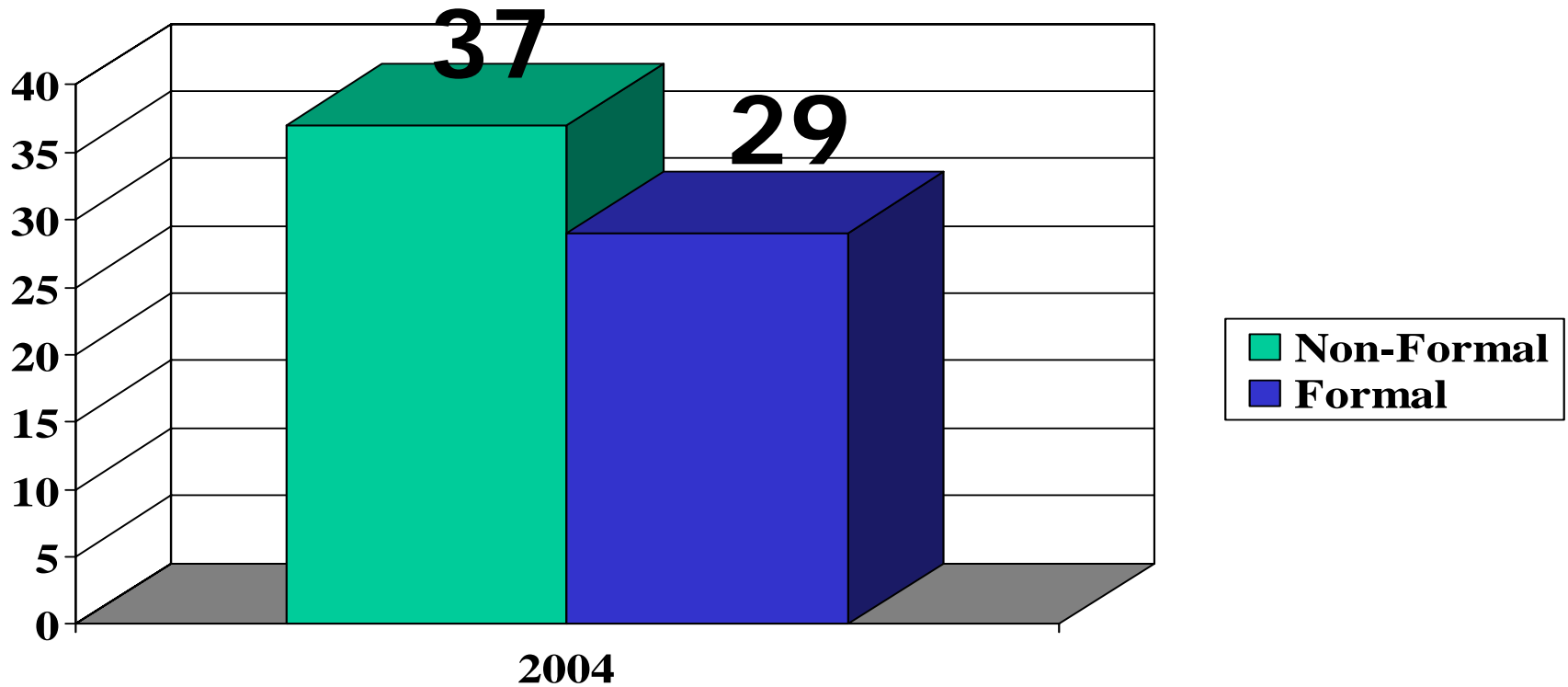
- Disposition: The outcome or finding of an investigation.

Types of “Dispositions”:

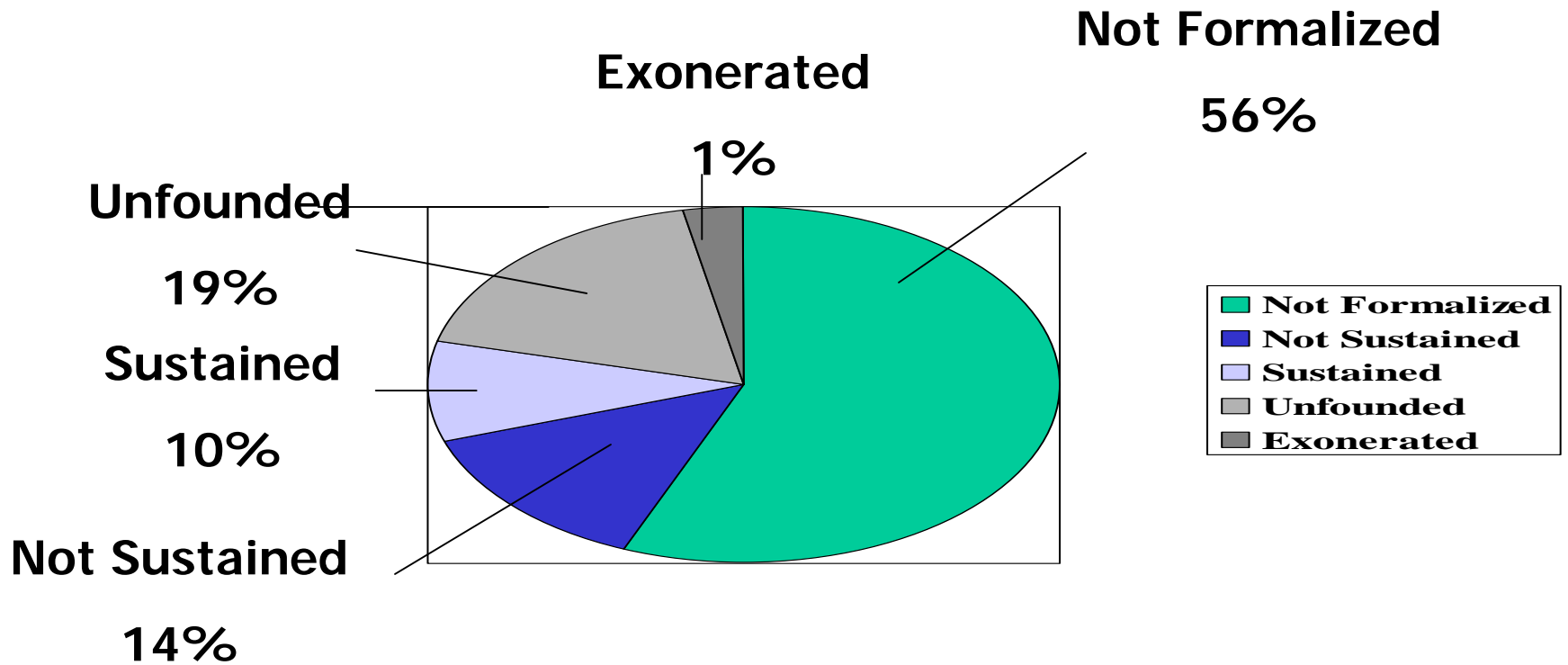
- Unfounded:
 - Investigation revealed actions did not occur
- Not Sustained:
 - No conclusive facts to prove or disprove
- Sustained:
 - Allegations were true and correct
- Exonerated:
 - Actions did occur, but were lawful and proper
- Not Formalized:
 - Complainant refuses to submit an affidavit detailing their allegations, or allegations made after time frame set forth for a timely complaint
